5. Directive Principles of State Policy (Part IV)

- Promoted policies for social justice and welfare, such as providing education, public health, and the prohibition of child labor.
- Articles 39 and 46 specifically direct the state to promote the welfare of weaker sections, including Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes.

6. Right Against Exploitation (Articles 23–24)

- Article 23: Prohibits human trafficking and forced labor.
- Article 24: Prohibits child labor in hazardous industries.

7. Political Representation (Articles 330–342)

- Reserved seats for Scheduled Castes (SC) and Scheduled Tribes (ST) in the Parliament and state legislatures.
- Ensured adequate political participation for marginalized communities.

8. Special Safeguards for Scheduled Areas and Tribes (Articles 244 and 5th & 6th Schedules)

- Provided for the administration and control of scheduled areas and tribes to protect their rights and resources.



9. Protection of Civil Rights Act, 1955

- Strengthened the provisions against untouchability and discrimination, ensuring that violators are punished.

10. Promotion of Education and Economic Interests (Article 46)

- Directed the state to promote the educational and economic interests of weaker sections and protect them from social injustice and exploitation.
